EVENT LAUNCH FOR NATIONAL POETRY MONTH

A breakfast media launch event for National Poetry Month was organized at Ben McNally Books in Toronto on April 1. The event was moderated by Damian Rogers, Arts and Lifestyle Editor at Eye Weekly. Also invited at the event were several renowned poets including Duke Redbird, Sue Sinclair and Margaret Christakos who presented readings at the event. The event was attended by several League members as well as organizers of the First International Festival of Poetry of Resistance.

Posters for NPM were posted around Ben McNally bookstores where the event was held and other strategic locations to raise awareness of NPM as well as the launch event A number of flyers, specifically prepared for the launch event, were then distributed in several places for maximum exposure for the event.

The event venue was procured free of charge after liaison with Ben McNally bookstores.

PRESS KIT

A press kit was prepared and provided to the media at the Launch event on April 1. Press releases were sent out on a regular basis beginning with the general press release and then followed up every week with the relevant media releases. The press release announcing the award winners for the Pat Lowther and the Gerald Lampert awards was sent out in June.

The Poetry Face-Off takes Flight for 2009


Starting February 6 in Regina, the poetic pugilists battle it out in CBC Radio's national competition.


5) See a poet

Alice Major, Katia Grubisic win big poetry prizes

Toronto -- Established Edmonton poet Alice Major and Montreal-based newcomer Katia Grubisic won the two highest honours granted annually by the League of Canadian Poets at its Poetry Fest in Vancouver on the weekend.

Major won the Pat Lowther Memorial Award, which honours the best book of poetry by a Canadian woman in the preceding year, for *The Office Tower Tales*, described by the jury as "an epic work, huge in scope."

Grubisic won the Gerald Lampert Memorial Award, which goes to the year's best first book of poetry, for *What if red ran out*, described as a "brilliantly authentic and inventive debut."
